Wanted! This is the only time it's good to be on a "wanted" poster! The electric cooperative is trying to reunite former members with unclaimed capital credits. Their "reward" is issued once we have a current mailing address.

These former cooperative members moved or died; we no longer have their current address or estate address. Yet, they are still owed capital

credits or their share of a profitable year.

Help Federated Rural Electric and Brown County REA (BCREA) locate these wanted members and provide us new addresses. Their capital credits check was returned last year - address unknown. If you know the current location for any of these former members, please have them call or e-mail the appropriate cooperative with their new address and/or phone number. We'll then mail their capital credits check. In addition, BCREA's list also includes older, uncashed accounts payable checks.

If we do not receive new addresses on these missing members, their un-



claimed capital credits checks are donated to a tax-exempt organization. Brown County Rural Electrical Association and Federated Rural Electric donate unclaimed capital credits to their Operation Round Up programs. Brown County REA's Round Up Trust donates to charitable organizations, individuals and families in crisis and scholarships in the co-

op's service area. Federated's Round Up Trust Board awards nine high school scholarships and awards the rest to other Operation Round Up recipients.

# Spring into spring cleaning & jump up your home's energy efficiency as well

Spring is a great time to refresh, clean and enhance energy efficiency at home. By adopting simple, yet effective energy-saving strategies during springcleaning routines, you can create an efficient-living environment that may also lower utility bills and extend the life of our heavily used appliances.

#### **HVAC** handy hints

Even though it's out of sight, don't leave it out of mind. Check the filter in your HVAC system. Your furnace worked hard during the winter. Ensuring your system

has a clean filter is a low-cost and easy way to protect your equipment and maximize efficiency. A dirty furnace filter can cause your system to work harder than necessary, decreasing efficiency and shortening the system's life.

While the filter is easy to replace yourself, have your air conditioning serviced and professionally cleaned. Both the indoor and outdoor units should be cleaned. Dirty refrigerant coils reduce efficiency. This also applies to heat pumps and ductless heat pumps, also known as mini-split systems. The technician can check refrigerant levels and refill or repair, if necessary.

HVAC contractors are busy responding to calls for repairs during the summer heat. Scheduling cleaning services for your air conditioning in

the spring — before the heat of the summer — can ensure the work gets done before the rush and even save you money. Some HVAC contractors offer special discounts for cleaning services in the milder months, which helps fill their schedules and keep their technicians working.

Window AC units can get dirty too. They can be cleaned with the proper tools, cleaning agents and know-how. Always unplug before cleaning; wait until completely dry to plug it back in again. Take the time to clean it properly in the spring before you need it in the summer.

#### Bright idea lighting tasks

Cleaning light fixtures and fixture covers can brighten your space by removing dust and grime collected during the winter. While you are at it, check your bulbs and replace any incandescent or compact fluorescents with energy-saving LEDs. Although they tend to cost a little more, LEDs last longer and use less energy.

Good-quality LED light bulbs are expected to last 30,000 to 50,000 hours, according to the Department of Energy. A typical incandescent lamp lasts about 1,000 hours, while a comparable compact fluorescent lamp (CFL) lasts 8,000 to 10,000 hours. As a comparison, if you have an LED light on for 10 hours a day, it can last 13 years versus about three months for incandescent

bulbs and about two-and-a-half years for CFLs.

#### Make the windows sparkle

If cleaning windows is on the list, check the seals and sash locks to ensure they close tightly. Check for areas that need caulking or sealing to reduce drafts. Sealing around windows adds to year-round comfort in your home. Clean windows also allow more light into the home, reducing the need to turn on lamps and overhead fixtures.

A clean oven window allows you to see the food and how it's cooking without opening the oven door, which wastes energy. A clean oven heats more evenly and quickly, providing better results and lower energy use.

Spring is the ideal time to declutter, deep clean and implement practices that not only tidy our homes, but also reduce energy consumption.

# LED low profile ceiling fans offer a new spin!

# **Electrical safety goes with spring cleaning**

It's time for spring cleaning! While dusting, decluttering, and organizing are essential tasks, electrical safety is even more important.

• Look for frayed cords, loose plugs or any signs of damage. If you spot any issues, refrain from using the appliance until it's repaired or replaced by a qualified professional. Additionally, clean appliances such as vacuum cleaners and hairdryers to remove dust and debris that can pose a fire risk.

• Examine all power outlets and switches in your home for signs of wear or damage. Loose outlets or switches can increase the risk of electrical shocks or fires. Ensure that outlet covers are in place and functioning correctly.

• Declutter areas around electrical fixtures such as light switches, outlets and circuit breaker panels.

# Manager's Message

**7 Cooperative Principles — what makes us unique!** The Cooperative Principles originated in 1844 when the Rochdale Society of Equitable Pioneers established the first modern cooperative in Rochdale, England.

1. Open and voluntary membership: Membership in a cooperative is open to all people who can reasonably use its services and stand willing to accept the responsibilities of

membership, regardless of race, religion, gender or economic circumstances.

2. Democratic member control: Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their members, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. Representatives (directors/trustees) are elected among the membership and are accountable to them. In primary cooperatives members have equal voting rights (one member, one vote); cooperatives at other levels are organized in a democratic manner.

3. Members' economic participation: Members contribute equitably to and democratically control the capital of their cooperative. At least part of that capital remains the common property of the cooperative. Members allocate surpluses for any or all of the following purposes: developing the cooperative; setting up reserves; benefiting members in proportion to their transactions with the cooperative; and supporting other activities approved by the membership.

4. Autonomy and independence: Cooperatives are autonomous, self-help organizations controlled by their members. If they enter into agreements with other organizations, including governments, or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure democratic control, as well as their unique identity.

5. Education, training and information: Education and training for members, elected representatives (directors/trustees), CEOs and employees help them effectively contribute to the development of their cooperatives. Communications about the nature and benefits of cooperatives, particularly with the general public and opinion leaders, help boost cooperative understanding.

6. Cooperation among cooperatives: By working together through local, national, regional and international structures, cooperatives improve services, bolster local economies and deal more effectively with social and community needs.

7. Concern for Community: Cooperatives work for the sustainable development of their communities through policies supported by the membership.

## Strategic planning recently done by Board and managers

These co-op principles serve as guiding lights for our operations. Another guiding light is a solid plan. Federated adopts a plan that contains goals and strategies for the short- and long-term benefit of the cooperative and our member-owners. The Board and management team just wrapped up a strategic planning session where we discussed literally every aspect of the cooperative. Clearly the electric operations are the main focus; however, we now have a viable broadband operation, which is garnering a lot of attention, especially when it comes to growth potential. The final plan will come to us over the next month or so; yet, we have a great idea what needs to take place and we are planning accordingly with all of the areas getting the attention they need. The electric operations must remain affordable, reliable, safe and sustainable. Great member service is also a pillar of our success and must be maintained. The broadband business must grow in order to facilitate a stable operation and achieve a debt-repayment ratio to insure solvency. There were many other topics identified, which will be part of the plan. Member communications was important for both electric and broadband. The group felt that the electric member communications were adequate; however, in order to grow the broadband business, communications must grow. It was noted that in order to get the required response, some door-to-door visits may be necessary. More to come after we get the full report. 🚇

## Chocolate Caramel Brownies by Terese Gruber, New Ulm

- 1 pkg. German Chocolate Cake mix (w/pudding)
- 1/3 c. evaporated milk
- <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> c. melted butter

- 2 eggs 1 pkg. caramels
- 1 pkg. chocolate chips

Mix together cake, butter and eggs; pour half of the mixture into a greased and floured 9x13" pan. Bake at 350° for 6 to 10 minutes. Sprinkle chocolate chips over mixture. Melt together the caramels and evaporated milk. Pour over chocolate chips. Pour remaining cake mixture over caramels. Bake at 350° for 20-25 minutes.

# Snicker Candy Bar by Barbara Sellner, Sleepy Eye

First layer: Melt together and pour into a prebuttered, foil-lined 9x13" pan. Cool. 1 c. milk chocolate chips <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c. butterscotch chips <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c. peanut butter Second layer: 1 c. sugar <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c. milk <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c. butter Boil five minutes from the time bubbles appear. Remove from heat. Add: 1 c. marshmallow cream 1/4 c. peanut butter 1 tsp. vanilla Pour over first layer. Sprinkle with 1-2 c. peanuts. Chill. Third laver: 40 caramels 1-2 T. water Melt in microwave until smooth and drizzle over peanuts. Fourth layer: Melt and spread over all other layers: 1 c. milk chocolate chips 1/4 c. butterscotch chips <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c. peanut butter Refrigerate.

# **Caramel Bars**

by Elizabeth Shimon, Granada 2 c. flour

- $1\frac{1}{2}$  c. brown sugar
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 c. oatmeal
- 21/2 sticks of butter, softened
- 1 tsp. baking soda

Mix the above ingredients and press half into a 9x13" pan. Bake 10 minutes at 350°.

Remove and sprinkle with 12 oz. semi-sweet chocolate chips and  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 c. pecans.

Unwrap 1 bag of caramels and melt with  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. evaporated milk in a double boiler or microwave. Pour the mixture over the oatmeal mixture.

Crumble and drop the remainder of the oatmeal crumbs on top.

Bake 20 minutes at 350°. Cool and cut into small bars.
