

Members have moved away...so help us find them for their capital credits pay day



Have these former cooperative members gone astray? No, they likely have just moved away. Help them find their way back to us. Your electric cooperative is trying to reunite former members with unclaimed capital credits. Their "pay day" is issued once we have a current mailing address.

These former cooperative members have moved or died; we no longer have their current address or estate address. Yet, they are still owed capital credits or their share of a profitable year.

Help Federated Rural Electric and Brown County REA (BCREA) locate these far away members and provide us new addresses. Their capital credits check was returned last year — address unknown. If you know the current location for any of these former members, please have them call or e-mail the appropriate cooperative with their new address and/or phone number. We'll then mail their capital credits check. In addition, BCREA's list also includes older, uncashed accounts payable checks. For older Federated unclaimed capital credits listing, go to their website.

If we do not receive new addresses on these missing members, their unclaimed capital credits checks are donated to a tax-exempt organization. Brown County Rural Electrical Association and Federated Rural Electric donate unclaimed capital credits to their Operation Round Up programs. Brown County REA's Round Up Trust donates to charitable organizations, individuals and families in crisis and scholarships in the co-op's service area. Federated's Round Up Trust Board awards nine high school scholarships and awards the rest to other Operation Round Up recipients. 4

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Matches are no match for electric lighter

How often have you tried to light a candle or campfire and the matches are missing or the gas lighter stick is empty? That's so frustrating!

See the light! Switch to an electric rechargeable lighter. It uses plasma arc technology that is windproof and flameless. That's perfect for campfires, lighting charcoal for grilling or wet conditions. It features a rechargeable lithium battery. Power it up using the USB charger cord to your computer, vehicle charger or power bank. The LED lights indicate when the electric fire stick is fully charged, which works for about 500 lightings. Safety features include a six-second power off and an external safety lock switch to keep children safe from accidental lighting.

Look for a model that features the flexible neck design. You can bend the flexible neck to reach inside a candle; avoid burning your fingers, which can occur with matches.

Look at your local hardware store, Walmart or Amazon. One may cost around \$9 or buy two for approximately \$12. 🗓

See the light! Flip the switch and start using a rechargeable electric plasma lighter for candles, camping and grilling — how thrilling!



Safety

Avoid being in a jam! Look out for these utility scams!


Scammers will try anything to deceive utility customers. We want to keep you safe. Learn about these utility scams so you can avoid being in a financial jam!

Payment due immediately

Never make a utility bill payment to anyone calling on the phone, coming to your door, texting you or e-mailing you for immediate utility payment, especially if your account is current or on Auto Pay. Hang up if caller asks you to go purchase a gift or debit card to settle your account balance. Always call your utility company at the number provided on your bill or the utility's website if you have a question about payment or billing information; do not call the scammer back at the same number used to call you.

Your electric cooperative will send a past due or disconnect notice before ever disconnecting for nonpayment. At that time your electric cooperative may call to work with you on

payment arrangements or credit card payments. Know your utility payment options: online, by phone, automatic transfer from your bank account, debit/credit card, mail, drop box or in person. The only time a cooperative employee may come to your door for payment is for disconnection due to nonpayment. The employee will drive a marked cooperative vehicle. This step occurs only after trying to



Overpayment call

With a new scam twist some scammers will call claiming you, the customer, overpaid your electric bill. If you receive a call, text or e-mail from someone claiming you overpaid a utility bill and need to provide your banking or credit card information to receive a credit, it's very likely a scam. In most cases your electric cooperative will apply a credit to your account to cover future charges or refund an overpayment with a mailed check to your address on file.

Power restoration rip off

Don't fall for a power restoration rip off. Scammers may contact you and offer to restore power quickly or in a preferential order if you make an immediate payment. These scams occur after major storms or disasters with widespread outages. We will never request or

require payment to restore power after a storm.

If post-storm repairs to customer-owned equipment are necessary, we will advise you to work with a licensed contractor. If any charges are applicable, you will be billed through your existing electric account and address on file with the cooperative. (1)



- \$25 Energy Star dehumidifier or Smart Wi-Fi thermostat.
- \$75 for Energy Star refrigerator or freezer with proof of recycling the old unit.
- \$500/ton for a ground source heat pump or \$600 for a ductless air source heat pump.
- \$1,000 for a SEER2 14.3-16.1 air source heat pump.
- \$1,500 for a SEER2 16.2 or higher air source heat pump.

A copy of the sales receipt must be submitted with all rebates. Look for these rebates as a bill credit.

Manager's Message

After February's cold snap, we welcome spring's arrival

We spring ahead to Daylight Savings Time March 9 at midnight. Plus, the spring equinox marks the first day of spring with equal daylight and night hours between March 20-21. We look forward to spring as we come out of the February deep freeze. Was it considered a polar vortex? Some say yes, while some say maybe. Load control was called upon frequently to

soften the peaks. Thank you all who are load control participants, as well as those who voluntarily reduced usage. Likely several peak days were seen. Our primary wholesale power supplier, Basin Electric, saw an all-time system peak.

Welcome Troy Post as our new District 2 director!

We welcome a new director to the board room. Troy Post attended his first meeting in February representing District 2. See story on Page 5. Welcome Troy! **Ethanol plant closing impacts our electricity sales**

Federated received the unfortunate news that Green Plains Ethanol in Fairmont closed due to various reasons. We hope that they will come back online this fall after harvest. Certainly, no guarantees exist. The loss of sales was felt and the forecast needed to be updated to reflect the loss, as well as the reduced purchases. Our financial team will be monitoring this monthly. Already we are identifying items that may be cut to offset the reduced margins. We will not let this negatively affect our reliability or members' service; we will get through this.

April 1 rate adjustment appears on May's electric bills.

An unrelated change that will take place starting in April is the 2025 rate adjustment. The February *Connections* newsletter story, along with the March electric bill insert, provide the details. This all came about prior to the Green Plains' closure and no adjustments were made to rates due to that.

Election results impact on energy policies?

The 2024 elections were pivotal for policies affecting electric co-ops. President Donald Trump's victory and Republicans' majorities in Congress could bring major changes to environmental rules, permitting requirements, funding programs and tax incentives that touch on co-ops' daily operations. This is a very fluid situation and will be a moving target. I will attend the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's Legislative Conference in Washington, D.C. in early March to hear the latest. We hope that policies hampering progress are eliminated, allowing the industry to do what needs to be done to keep the lights on and affordable.

Building remodel update as details are finalized

We have selected a general contractor and a series of meetings in March will result in a timeline. I am hopeful the project will get underway in June of 2025 and be completed by the end of the year or early 2026. What we understand is the most efficient way to do this is to vacate the building so contractors can have access to every part of the affected area. Thus, our office will be closing to foot traffic and relocating temporarily. We are working on a location and will report to you as soon as we get that nailed down. We will set up a way for members to access employees as needed, probably through scheduling appointments.

The payment drop box is something that members like to use; however, in the event that it becomes inaccessible, I will put in a plug for some of the other payment options. Here's a breakdown of use by members: ACH (Auto Pay or automatic bank transfer) tops the list at 45 percent; credit cards at 25 percent; paper checks at 23 percent; with e-checks and cash around 7 percent. The preferred method is ACH, as no fees apply. Paper checks or cash have no fees either, but requires manual entry by staff. Credit card and e-check all have fees associated with them, which end up costing Federated a percentage of the charge. Hopefully, you are willing to make the switch to the ACH program to avoid any hassles during construction. If so, our staff is ready to assist you. See the story at the bottom of Page 1.

Troy Post appointed to fill District Two Director term

The Nominating Committee met to fill this position due to a retirement, providing names to the Board of Directors; they appointed Troy as the director until the August Annual Meeting elections. School and earned an AAS degree in small business and accounting from the University of Minnesota in Crookston.

Egg Yolk Chocolate Chip Cookie Bars

If you made an angel food cake and find yourself with an abundance of egg yolks, this is a great recipe to use them up!

1 c. softened butter3/4 tsp. baking soda1 c. light brown sugar, packed3/4 tsp. baking powder

½ c. white granulated sugar 1 tsp. salt

5 large egg yolks $2\frac{1}{2}$ c. all-purpose flour 2 tsp. vanilla extract 2 c. chocolate chips, divided

Preheat your oven to 350°F and prepare a 9x13" baking pan with non-stick spray. In a large bowl beat together the butter and sugars until combined and fluffy. Beat in the egg yolks and vanilla extract. Then beat in the baking soda, baking powder and salt. Add the flour and use a large spoon or spatula to mix the dough together. Stir in 1¾ c. of the chocolate chips (the rest will go on top). Spoon the dough into your prepared baking pan. Use the spoon to evenly spread and gently flatten the dough. Sprinkle the remaining ¼ c. of chocolate chips on top and gently press them into the dough. Bake the bars at 350°F for 25-30 minutes or until the edges are lightly browned and the center no longer looks wet. Allow the bars to cool completely in the pan placed on a cooling rack.
